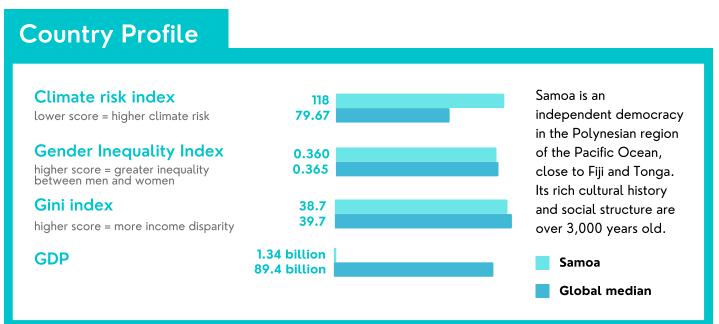
Samoa

A case study of community-led violence prevention

A 2018 report from the Samoa Office of the Ombudsman reported that 86% of women had experienced physical violence from an intimate partner in their lifetime (1).



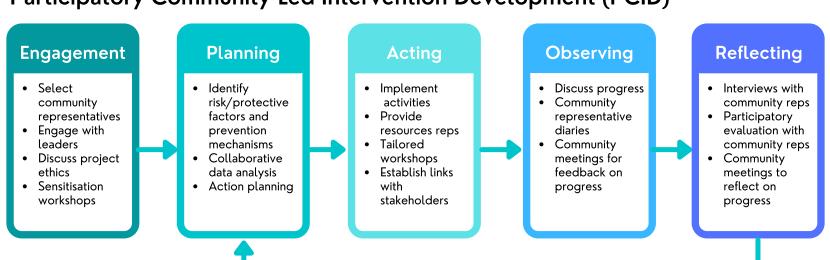


The EVE Project, in partnership with Samoa Victim Support Group (SVSG), works with 20 community-based researchers to identify context-specific targets and methods to address violence against women and girls using a Participatory Community-led Intervention Development (PCID) approach. PCID centres Southern epistemologies in research through co-creation of methods, theories and interventions with community members (2).

Twenty village reps have been selected in Samoa to participate in collaborative workshops. They are conducting interviews and focus group discussions to better understand violence in their communities and how to address it effectively.
