NUS launched Bachelor of Health Science Programme

Monday 29th January 2024

The National University of Samoa (NUS) officially launched its Bachelor of Health Science programme on January 29, 2024, in a ceremony attended by notable guests including the New Zealand Deputy High Commissioner and Samoa's Director General of Health.

The programme was developed in response to a 2020 initiative by the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Samoa Ministry of Health aimed at enhancing Samoa's primary care and allied health workforce.

With a significant funding commitment of NZD3.49 million from New Zealand over five years, the initiative will focus on designing and delivering the programme in collaboration with various Samoan authorities.

NUS's Vice Chancellor expressed gratitude to all partners for their support, especially recognizing the collaborative efforts amidst challenges such as the measles outbreak and the global pandemic.

The programme aims to equip allied health professionals with essential skills and



knowledge, with 17 students already enrolled for the first semester.

NUS envisions this programme alongside its existing Medicine and Nursing courses as a key contributor to strengthening Samoa's healthcare workforce and services.

FOHS: New Zealand's health workforce, with a focus on Pacific participation in the health workforce.

28th February 2024



Professor Peter Crampton delivered a seminar on New Zealand's health workforce, with a focus on Pacific participation in the health workforce. Professor Crampton, a specialist in public health medicine and a Professor of Public Health at the University of Otago, shared his expertise and research on social indicators, social epidemiology, health care policies, and health care organization and funding. With over 100 articles published in peer-reviewed journals, Professor Crampton provided valuable insights into the current landscape of New Zealand's health workforce and the

importance of Pacific participation in shaping the future of healthcare in the region.

The seminar was attended by faculty members and professionals in the field of health science, providing a unique opportunity for knowledge exchange and networking. We extend our gratitude to Professor Crampton for sharing his expertise and valuable insights with our community, and we look forward to more engaging seminars in the future.

FOS: The combined effects of ocean acidification, warming and light on Caulerpa spp., the role of inorganic carbon physiology and species ranges.

28th February 2024.

Aleluia Taise-Uili explored the impacts of ocean acidification, warming, and light exposure on the vital macroalgal genus Caulerpa, crucial for ecology and cuisine. Her research focused on two species, C. brownii and C. geminata, found in Wellington, New Zealand, revealing their differing responses to environmental stressors due to unique carbon uptake strategies. Through a series of controlled experiments, Uili found critical insights into how climate

change may disrupt marine ecosystems, emphasizing the pressing need to understand these dynamics to protect our oceans.




MARCH 2023 SEMINARS

FOBE: Making an Impact on Organizations and Society through Projects and Programs

1st March 2024

During the FOBE seminar, Professor Ofer Zwikael illuminated the vital role that projects and programs play in transforming organizations and enhancing society. Addressing the need for positive economic, social, and environmental impacts, he emphasized that true success lies in realizing tangible benefits—such as improved health services for communities. Drawing on extensive research and experience in project management, especially in the South Pacific. Professor Zwikael also shared



insights on how organizations can effectively navigate change to generate impactful outcomes.

FOE: Overview of Utu: The Samoa Archaeological & Cultural Heritage Database for the Independent State of Samoa


1st March, 2024

Greg Jackmond delivered a comprehensive overview of "Utu": The Samoa Archaeological & Cultural Heritage Database, tailored for the Independent State of Samoa. Initiated in 2014 by the Centre for Samoan Studies (CSS), Utu is a dynamic, ongoing project designed to gather and preserve vital information regarding the archaeology and cultural heritage of Samoa. The database boasts a wealth of resources, including a variety of maps, shapefiles, and extensive datasets that facilitate research and education in this vital area. During his presentation,

FOBE: Samoa Poverty Analysis

14th March 2024

Papaliitele Fasavalu Benjamin Sila, an ACEO for the Social Statistics Division at Samoa Bureau of Statistics, presented on an indepth analysis of poverty in Samoa, utilizing data from the 2018 Household Income and Expenditure Survey (HIES). The presentation emphasized the Bureau's role in various statistical activities, including the Population and Housing Census, Agriculture Census,

The speaker discussed the prevalence of both monetary and non-monetary poverty in the country, aiming to identify vulnerable populations that require targeted support and interventions. This analysis is intended to inform evidence-based policymaking, ensuring that critical groups are not overlooked and that their social wellbeing can be improved.



FOE: Taking issues with the Pi Faitau: A relook at the Samoan Alphabet Chart in the 21st Century.

22nd March 2024

Dr. Levi Tavita, critically examined the Samoan Alphabet Chart, known as the Pi Faitau (or Pi Tautau), and its historical significance in promoting literacy in the Samoan language over the past 150 years. The Pi Faitau has played an essential role in increasing literacy rates in Samoa, significantly impacting the community and

contributing to the fluency of Samoan adults, as evidenced by their ability to read the Samoan Bible.

Despite its success, the seminar raises important questions about the current relevance and accuracy of the Pi Faitau. Dr. Tavita explores Le Tagaloa's critiques, which

highlight inconsistencies in the relationship between letters and sounds within the chart.

These discrepancies may lead to misrepresentations of Samoan sounds, particularly concerning vowel sounds and the emergence of alternative sound registers, such as the 'k' sound.

The seminar aimed to articulate why these concerns about the Pi Faitau, which have been largely ignored for years, should be addressed now. It emphasizes the need to re-evaluate the chart to ensure the integrity of the Samoan language and its sounds is preserved in contemporary usage.

The discussion was crucial for understanding how evolving linguistic needs and educational practices impact the Samoan people today.

Dr. Levi Tavita is a Senior Lecturer at the Centre of Samoan Studies, with extensive experience in education, journalism, and public service in both Samoa and New Zealand. His scholarly background includes a PhD in Samoan government and politics, along with work in publishing educational

resources.
